

## { STONE SETTING }

This is one of my favorite ways to set gemstones. It's quick, easy and looks professional. The step-by-step below shows how to set a rectangular gemstone, however any shape gemstone can be set with the same technique. Simply use a cutter that matches the shape of the stone. Straws are great for round stones. For gemstones without a matching cutter shape, simply use a craft blade or tissue blade to cut the bezel shape close to the shape of the stone.



Measure each stone by laying the stone with the pointed side up on a flat surface. Then stack cards next to the stone to find out the height of the stone in card thickness.



In this case the stone was 7 cards thick. Add an additional two cards to make the stack 9 cards thick. Roll out the clay to the appropriate thickness.



2 Set other types of stones in this fashion. Roll out the clay to the correct thickness. Squeeze the end of a straw and use it to cut the opening.



Insert the gemstone so that the top of the stone is level to the top of the clay.



3 Cut out the center of the clay with a rectangular cutter. The size of the cut out should be smaller than the stone. Be sure there is at least I/8" or more of clay between the opening and the edge of the bezel.




Push the stone into the opening. Make sure that the top of the stone is at the same level as the surface of the clay.



3 Use a tissue blade to roughly cut around the gemstone. Leave enough excess bezel to account for sanding. Set aside to dry completely.



Use an emery board to file the edges of the bezel.



5 Next, using a tissue blade, cut out the edges of the bezel. Set aside to dry.



5 File the edges until the bezel shape matches the shape of the stone.



Using this method a bezel can be created for any shape of gemstone.
